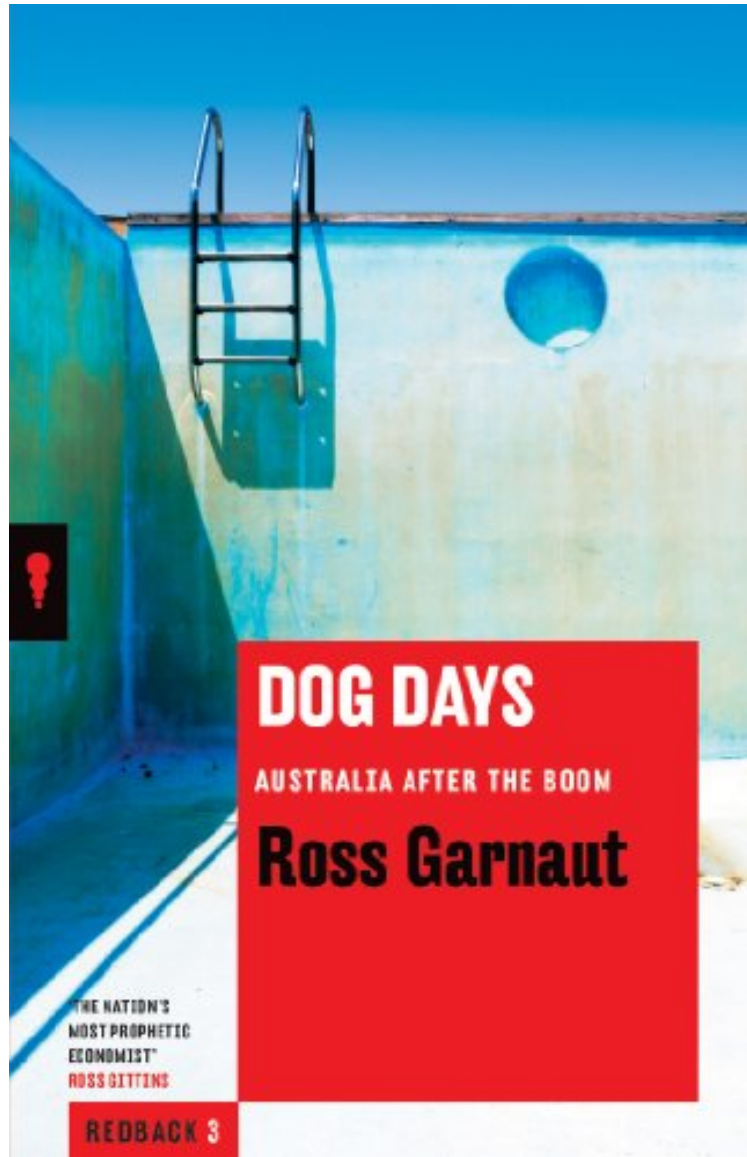

Because otherwise if Professor Garnaut's predictions of possible future multiple recessions and high unemployment come true, it will come as a shock to many and leave them unprepared. Thanks to a 1 in 100-year terms-of-trade windfall, Australia was once again the luckiest country in the world with no recession in over 20 years. But stability breeds instability. Paradoxically, thanks to China's 1in100-year

building boom stimulus, an extra one trillion dollars of mining revenue over the last 10 years (which was mostly squandered) has left Australia extremely vulnerable to a deep recession or even a possible financial panic as the terms-of-trade reverts back to normal. This is all well explained in the book. Professor Garnaut tries to remain positive throughout the book and devotes half the book to suggestions on how to fix the problems, however, when I read between the lines I sense that Australia is rapidly becoming the unlucky country, with little hope of really avoiding a big fall in the standard of living. Well known international fund manager Jeremy Grantham once said criticise Australians and you get World War Three.
